### **Governor April's Thoughts About Convention**

It was really great to be at the convention this year and I was proud to represent District Eleven as the Governor. I am also excited to be part of the leadership team for this biennium and be able to work with International President Linda Smith and all of the other wonderful District Governors.

Sharing the experience of an International Convention with district board members and committee chairs was valuable. As district leaders it gave us the opportunity to share ideas with each other, pick up new concepts, hear other viewpoints, focus on district needs and be inspired. We got excited about topics and issues we are hoping to focus on in the next couple of years.

We were all so proud to see our Immediate Past Governor Melinda Aguirre installed on the International Board as a Director and Past Governor Pat Zoller was elected to the International Nominating Committee. District Clubs who were acknowledged included:

- Altrusa of Coachella Valley, CA was named as one of the five new clubs for 2021-2023.
- Altrusa of Golden Valley, CA Club Net Gain Membership Award, Third Place
   and Club Net Gain Per Capita Membership Award, Third Place.
- Altrusa of Long Beach, CA Club Net Gain Per Capita, Second Place.



### **Recap of the Convention**

District Eleven was represented by twenty Altrusans from nine clubs at the 58th International Convention held July 19-22, 2023, in San Antonio, TX. A total of 323 registered Altrusans were in attendance, representing 126 clubs and all 14 districts. Despite the heatwave, with temperatures reaching 106°, attendees were ready to conduct some business, acquire new information, rekindle longtime friendships, and have some fun!

The flag ceremony was conducted at the opening banquet, with flags representing seven countries, the United



Nations, ASTRA, Altrusa International Foundation, and Altrusa International Inc. The banquet entertainment honored the Hispanic culture of San Antonio and featured an all-female Mariachi band followed by folkloric dancers.

In the business sessions, several bylaw changes were approved and have been updated in the Altrusa International Official Bylaws and posted on the website, www.altrusa.org. Friday night included a Texas style party showcasing "Piano Punch Dueling Pianos". Attendees were encouraged to wear cowboy boots, hats, jeans, and bring some extra cash. A total of \$2,338 from the "Tip Jar" was donated to the International Foundation. This money was raised by tipping to have a favorite song played, tipping to outbid an unwanted song, or tipping to see your Altrusa BFF on stage.

Convention keynote speakers included:

- Alex Johnson, a business coach from Plano, TX, has been awarded accolades for his recruiting and leadership skills. He led his own Rotary club to become the fastest-growing service club in North America.
- Brian Floca, an author and illustrator. His book 'Locomotive' was the winner of the 2014 Caldecott Medal. Brian's books have been selected for the annual New York Times Best Illustrated Books list.
- Susan Burkholder, a Director of Community Awareness for Ransomed Life and an active member of the Alamo Area Coalition Against Trafficking. Ransomed Life is a healing community for sexually exploited youth.
- Kent Julian taught us that the way we view things is the way we do things. He explained that the way we respond to life events can be the foundation of success. Despite starting out as an at-risk child with severe learning challenges, he went on to become the Executive Director of a national youth organization and launched two successful businesses.

The final night of the convention brought everyone together in a little fancier attire and ready to celebrate the installation of our new International President and her board.

## **NOMINATIONS FOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE 2024-2026**

### **Nominating Committee Chair 2022-24** – Sue Larkin, West Valley

Every two years your conference delegates elect a new Nominating Committee to serve for the next two years. The current nominating committee was elected at the Conference in 2022 and are serving until 2024. We are Sue Larkin, Chairman from the West Valley Club, Charlotte Perry from the San Diego Club, and Kathy Telleria from the Golden Valley Club. It is now time for us to replace ourselves! In order to do so, we are asking each club president to think about a member of your club who would be a great member of this committee.







The only clubs NOT eligible to put

forth a member are the West Valley, San Diego and Golden Valley because the current committee members are from those clubs.

Qualifications:

• A nominee must have attended at least one of the two previous District Conferences.

• It is strongly suggested the nominee plan on attending the District Conference in 2024 where the election for the committee will be held.

#### **Requirements:**

- Committee members will serve for two years. The first year to manage nominations for the Slate of District Officers. The second year to manage nominations for the slate of the District Nominating Committee as well as nominations for International Committee positions that the district may be eligible to submit.
- The nominee for the committee with the most votes at the Conference will serve as the Nominating Committee Chair.

IN ADDITION, District Eleven is eligible to submit a nominee for Altrusa International Foundation Trustee. In order to select that nominee, we are requesting nominations from your club for members who meet the criteria. Those nominated by their clubs will be included on the official ballot at the 2024 Conference and the person receiving the most votes will be submitted as the nominee from District Eleven. Then that person will run for Foundation Trustee at the 2025 Convention.

#### Qualifications

- Must be an Active or Active Retired member in good standing of an Altrusa Club, including Clubs-at-Large.
- Must have current or prior experience with a charitable corporation or foundation, serving in an elected or appointed position with policymaking responsibility.
- Must have served a full term as president of an Altrusa Club or a full term as president/chairman of an Altrusa Club Foundation
- If elected and while serving as Altrusa International Foundation Trustee member must not serve as an Association (club) officer, board member, chair or member of Association standing or special committee or an Association special appointee. Service in such positions of the Association's Districts shall not disqualify a candidate unless during their term as Governor of a District.

Do you or your club have any proposals for changes or additions to the Bylaws of Altrusa International? Submitted proposals will be presented at the 2024 District Eleven Conference, scheduled for May 2-4, of 2024.

Submitted proposals will be provided in the Call to Conference District Service Bulletin (DSB) edition that will be available in February of 2024. All District Eleven members will have the opportunity to review these proposals and discuss them at their club level. Conference Delegates will be responsible for representing their clubs during the voting process. All proposals approved during the District Eleven 2024 Conference will be submitted to Altrusa International for consideration at the International Convention in 2025.

District Officers, District Committee Chairs, Past Governors, Clubs, and individual members are invited to submit proposals for change or additions to Bylaws, Resolutions, or Recommendations (BRR) to Koni Shaff, District Eleven Second Vice Governor, District BRR Chair.

Each proposal presented should include the following:

- > a history with background and rationale;
- > an implementation date;
- a list of other bylaws or policies affected by the proposed bylaws, resolution, or recommendations;
- > the fiscal impact, if any;
- > and the suggested motion.

## **Director & International Foundation Liaison** *Cindy Mansfield*

There are a couple of changes on the Altrusa International Foundation Grants Programs and Awards. First is that clubs and districts are only eligible to receive one (1) Service Project Grant per fiscal year (June 1-May 31) for a maximum award of \$4000. Additionally, that the club or district cannot apply for an Individual Grant and a Service Project Grant in the same fiscal year. Thirdly, the Newly Chartered Club Grant for up to \$2000 now cuts into the Service Project Grant allocation, which would now max-out at \$2000 (for a total of \$4000 to the club). This information is spelled out on the page <u>Grants Programs and Awards – Altrusa International Foundation</u>

Cycle Two deadline for Grants is March 15, 2024. Applications and Guidelines (in English and Spanish) are available on the website referenced in the previous paragraph. Don't forget to fully complete the application. And those Grant recipients from Cycle One of last year have follow-up reports due really soon (12-months from the grant award).

Altrusa International Foundation is celebrating its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary with the development of the "6 for 60 Giving Campaign". (This replaces last year's Project Generosity Challenge.) Contributions to the Foundation over \$60 will receive a special commemorative ribbon, with the color designating the amount of the contributions during the fiscal year (June 1, 2023-May 31, 2024). \$60 light blue ribbon; \$160 white ribbon; \$260 teal ribbon; \$560 dark blue ribbon; \$860 maroon ribbon; and \$1060 gold ribbon. Your contributions may be designated to any of the standard designations of the Foundation (Grants, Lamplighter, Disaster Relief Fund, Endowment Fund, Club 21 Program, and/or Where Needed Most). I'd also like to ask each Altrusan to consider making the donation of an item for the Silent Auction at the 2024 District Eleven Conference scheduled for May 3-4 in Oxnard, CA. Proceeds from the Auction go to the Altrusa International Foundation. If you need ideas, Danielle listed some of the most popular items from last year in the Summer 2023 DSB. It's always fun to see who's bidding on what and to get in a "bidding war" with someone from your own or another club. I'm looking forward to managing the Silent Auction, as well as the Tammy Fournier Fun & Fitness Event, and presiding at the Foundation Luncheon in Oxnard.

We are also happy to share that District Eleven submitted a request for Disaster Relief Grant for the Maui Fires that was approved. The Foundation sent \$5000 to the Maui United Way organization that was working directly with residents of the area to help them with their immediate needs. Thanks to Past Governor Pat Zoller who worked with Governor April to write the grant request.
